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

DECEMBER IN HISTORY

Symbols of December

Birthstone: Turquoise,

Flower: Narcissus or Holly

Christmas Plant: Poinsettia

December was originally the tenth month of the year in the Roman calendar. It gets its name from the Latin word which means tenth. However, when the Romans added January and February to the calendar, it became the twelfth month.

They still kept the name, though. It is the first month of winter and the last month of the year. December in the Northern Hemisphere is similar to June in the Southern Hemisphere.

The first day of astronomical winter is on either December 21 or 22. This is the shortest day of the year and the longest night. It is called the Winter or Southern solstice in the Northern Hemisphere.

At the beginning of December, the season of Advent starts. The word advent means 'coming', and as its name suggests it is a time of preparation for the coming feast at Christmas. Christmas, the mass of Christ, is held on

25th December and celebrates the birth of Our Lord Jesus Christ over 2000 years ago.

December is also a month of multicultural celebrations.

The following multicultural events and celebrations are among those that will happen this year:

- Saint Nicholas Day (Christian)
- Fiesta of Our Lady of Guadalupe (Mexican)
- St. Lucia Day (Swedish)
- Hanukkah (Jewish)
- Christmas Day (Christian)
- Boxing Day (Australian, Canadian, English, Irish)

Great Union Day 2018

Great Union Day in Romania is celebrated annually every 1 December .

Great Union Day, occurring on December 1 is the national holiday of Romania. It marks the unification of Transylvania, Bessarabia, and Bukovina with the Romanian Kingdom in 1918. This holiday was set after the Romanian Revolution and celebrates the assembly of the delegates of Romanians held in

Alba Iulia, declaring the Union of Transylvania with Romania.

On December 1, 1918 (November 18 Old Style), the National Assembly of the Romanians of Transylvania formed of 1,228 elected representatives of the Romanians in Transylvania, Banat, Crişana and Maramureş, met in Alba Iulia and decreed (by unanimous vote) “the unification of those Romanians and of all the territories inhabited by them with Romania.”

Christmas Lights Day

Before the invention of electric lights, families would balance candles on the branches of their Christmas trees. Electric Christmas lights were first invented in 1880 by Thomas Edison, however it took another several decades for the invention to catch on. And it wasn't until 1903, when General Electric began selling pre-assembled kits of Christmas lights, the electric lights became popular with people of all classes.

The story of solstice

Solstice means “sun standing still.” In the Northern Hemisphere, it is the first day of winter, the shortest day and longest night of the year, occurring on the 20th, 21st or 22nd of December.

The introduction of Christmas

In the year 274AD, solstice fell on 25th December. Roman Emperor Aurelian proclaimed the date as “Natalis Solis Invicti,” the festival of the birth of the invincible sun. In 320 AD, Pope Julius I specified the 25th of December as the official date of the birth of Jesus Christ. In 325AD, Constantine the Great, the first Christian Roman emperor, finally changed the ancient solstice celebrations into Christmas, announcing that it would be an immovable feast, officially celebrated as the birth of Christ.

Christmas Eve - December 24

The anticipation of reindeer hooves pitter-pattering on the roof, Christmas

Eve dinner by the fire, Christmas carolling amidst glowing holiday lights, evening church services, staying up late to prepare the stockings.... These are what makes Christmas Eve for many one of the most magical days of the year. While Christmas Eve traditions vary by culture and country, one thing is for sure, no matter who or where you are—on December 24, the fantastical becomes possible, and magic is all around us.

Christmas - December 25



There are so many things to love about the Christmas holiday. The great thing about Christmas is that there is a joyful festivity for everyone to enjoy. Although Christmas has roots in Christianity and honours the birth of Jesus Christ, it has evolved over two millennia into a worldwide celebration that's both religious and secular. Every year on December 25, we celebrate Christmas, a day for spending time with family, honouring Christ's

birth, partaking in beautiful traditions, or just spreading some holiday cheer!

You should know that...

The figure of Father Christmas (Santa Claus) is based on the patron saint of children, Saint Nicholas (270-310AD). He became well known for supporting the needy. He would often be seen, clad in red and white bishop's robes and riding on a donkey, handing out gifts to children.

Santa Claus in New York

The Dutch, under Peter Stuyvesant, founded New York – named New Amsterdam under the Dutch and renamed when the British took over the colony – and brought with them the celebrations of Sinterklaas, the Dutch name for Saint Nicholas. Santa Claus is the American pronunciation of Sinterklaas.

Mistletoe and holly at Christmas

Mistletoe is a symbol for peace and joy. The idea originated in the ancient times of the Druids: whenever enemies met

under the mistletoe in the forest, they had to lay down their arms and observe a truce until the next day. From this comes the custom of hanging a ball of mistletoe from the ceiling as a sign of friendship and goodwill.

In the Celtic language mistletoe means “all-heal.”



Did you know?

The first Christmas trees

According to some sources, the Christmas tree is actually a throwback to "Yggdrasil," the Great Tree of Life mentioned in Norse mythology. The first documented use of a tree at Christmas and New Year celebrations is argued between the cities of Tallinn in Estonia and Riga in Latvia! Both claim that they had the first trees; Tallinn in 1441 and Riga in 1510. The modern custom of an indoor Christmas tree is thought to have originated in Germany. German Christians would bring trees into their homes to decorate.

The famous Christmas reindeer

At one stage it was thought that Father Christmas (Santa Claus) lives in the North Pole. In 1925 it was discovered that there are no reindeer in the North

Pole. But there are lots in Lapland, Finland. So today we know that the reindeer live around the secret village of Father Christmas and the elves somewhere on the Korvatunturi mountain in the Savukoski county of Lapland, Finland, which is on the Finnish-Russian border.

Names of the Christmas

reindeer

Rudolph is the most famous



reindeer. He is the leader of the other 8, whose names are *Blitzen, Comet, Cupid, Dancer, Dasher, Donder, Prancer, and Vixen.*

The names of the 8 reindeer were published by Clement Clark Moore, an American poet and professor of theology, in his 1822 poem “A Visit From St. Nicholas.”

Christmas stockings



A special Christmas tradition is hanging your stocking for Santa to fill

with small presents. This tradition comes to us from Holland, where children hang stockings for Sinter Klaas to fill.

But why stockings? Here is one story. Long ago there was a merchant who had three daughters. Sadly, the merchant somehow lost all of his money. His daughters were going to be sold as servants to pay his bills. During their last night at home the girls washed their stockings and hung them by the fire to dry. Bishop Nicholas, hearing about their fate, dropped gold down the chimney into each girl's stocking.

The girls were saved!

When their father heard who had given the gold, he went around town praising Bishop Nicholas.

Ever since, children have hung stockings by the chimney in the hopes that Santa Claus will fill their stockings with gifts, too.

The Christmas candy cane,

shaped as  a shepherds' crook, represents the

humble shepherds who were first to worship the new-born Christ.

Legend has it that the candy cane was invented in 1670 by a choirmaster at the Cologne Cathedral who handed out the bent sugar sticks among children to keep them quiet during the Living Crèche ceremony.

Did you know?

English is the official language of 54 countries, almost double any other country. It is the most widely used language in the world, and is used by many international organizations.

“Merry Christmas” is much more common than “Happy Christmas”, although the latter is sometimes heard.

Beginning about two weeks before Christmas, “Merry Christmas” is the common greeting in the United Kingdom, Ireland, and America.

Boxing Day - December 26



Did you know that Boxing Day originated in the UK?

Boxing Day is a great excuse to give gifts to people. Everyone loves a gift so give your family and friends a gift from you.

Boxing Day is observed only in the United Kingdom, Canada, Hong Kong, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and some other Commonwealth nations.

Whose is a possessive pronoun like 'her', 'his', 'our' and etc... We use **WHOSE** to find out which person something belongs to.

Example Sentences

- **Whose** car is this ?
- **Whose** notebook was stolen in the class?
- The child **whose** bicycle has been lost cried.
- The girl **whose** bag is red is looking for you.

Who's is always a contraction for who is.

Who is → **Who's**

Example Sentences

- **Who's** driving that blue car?
- **Who's** to be responsible?
- **Who's** that man?
- **Who's** playing the guitar?
- **Who's** your favorite TV star?



Using **Very** and **Every**

VERY

Very is used to add emphasis. We use it before adverbs and adjectives. It means in a high degree.

Examples

- She said, "I am **very** happy".
- It was **very** difficult.
- This answer is **very** interesting.
- It's a **very** small window.
- I love you both **very** much.

EVERY

We use **every** to talk about collectively things more than individually. It means each, all.

Examples

- I shave **every** morning.
- She wanted to get away from **everyday** life.
- I take a break **every** three hours.
- **Every** artist is sensitive.

3. Abstract Noun

Something that you can not perceive with your five senses
Belief, love, pride, happiness etc...

4. Concrete Noun

Something that you can perceive with your five senses
Apple, lion, eyes, flower etc...

5. Countable Noun

Can be counted
Pencil/pencils, apple/apples, train, clock etc...

6. Uncountable Noun

Cannot be counted
Milk, music, food, water, snow, rice etc...

7. Compound Noun

Made up of two or more smaller words
Textbook, snowball, seafood, sunflower

8. Collective Noun

Refer to a group of things as one whole
Bunch, audience, flock, group, family

9. Singular Noun

Refer to one person, place things, or idea
Cat, dog, ship, monkey, hero etc...

10. Plural Noun

Refer to more than one person, place things, or idea
Dogs, cats, ships, babies etc..
